Can he find his way inside the hallowed halls of this institution if he sings in his own key?

Celebrating Karamu's Leadership

Aseelah Shareef is the Vice President + Chief Operating Officer of Karamu where she offers a unique combination and understanding of inspirational leadership, operations and logistics, organizational programming, and artistry, and the capacity to master multiple roles. She has brought to Karamu an incredible history of experiences to include performing in Step Afrika!, the world's only professional dance company dedicated to the art of stepping (body percussion), which toured nationally and internationally, and teaching and co-creating new curriculum for Dance at Cuvahoga Community College. She was the former executive director of Cleveland Contemporary Dance Theatre, Events Manager for the Cleveland Metropolitan School District, and Director of Dance for Cleveland School of the Arts. Her current role is Vice President + Chief Operating Officer at Karamu House, where she implements operational efficiencies across product lines, has developed new arts residency programs, and curates socially and culturally responsive community arts experiences including after-school and weekend arts education models for life-long learners. She recently and concurrently served as the Interim Executive Director of the Cleveland Arts Prize, the nation's oldest municipal arts award. She is a 2023 YWCA of Greater Cleveland Woman of Achievement, was a member of the inaugural 2019 Arts and Culture Leaders of Color Fellowship cohort sponsored by Americans for the Arts, The Joyce Foundation and American Express. Her community involvement includes membership in Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Ohio Advisory Group of the National Museum of Women in the Arts (Board Member), 10K Movement (Advisory Board Member), Cleveland Arts Prize (Board of Trustees Chair), the Greater Cleveland Urban Film Foundation (Board Member), and Future Heights Grantmaking Committee (member). Aseelah holds an MA in Arts Administration and BS in Exercise Science from The Florida State University.



SUMMER PROGRAMS

> SUMMER ARTS INTENSIVE

7 week performing arts intensive for students completing grades 7-12.

> FAMILY NIGHT

All arts education students and families receive complimentary tickets to see Karamu mainstage productions.

> SCHOOL TOURS

Hosted on Tuesdays and Thursday schools and organizations receive a tour and workshop on the history of Karamu.

> ADULT PROGRAMMING

Aspiring and seasoned adult actors are welcomed to join acting workshop exploring objectives, tactics and script analysis. Adults can also train in tap classes free thanks to funding from Cleveland Clinic.

> YOUTH PROGRAMMING

Karamu Arts Academy provides intensive theatre education course, training youth to perform on a professional level. Students in grades K-12 receive training in dance, theatre, and vocal music. Sessions take place in the Fall and Spring and culminates in productions demonstrating technique, historical knowledge and social justice. (Littles K-2),

KARAMU ARTS ACADEMY 4 PILLARS

On these four pillars we build every artist as individuals and creatives;

Sacred Space - We create an environment in which any individual can feel confident that they will not be exposed to discrimination, criticism, harassment, or any other emotional or physical

Technique - We provide professional training in the technique required to perform/create within very art discipline.


Culture/History - We connect historical events and social issues to works of art developed due to cultural shifts and social impact. Artists will understand the societal context in which technique shift and new works are created.


